Aim of the Workshop:

The TSI (Technical Support Instrument) is operated by the European Commission's Directorate General for Structural Reform Support (DG REFORM). TAIEX TSI events are organised by DG NEAR in agreement with DG REFORM for the benefit of Member States that are receiving technical support through the TSI.

The goal of this workshop is twofold: to see how data can help achieve strategic development goals for island economies in a multi-level governance system, and to understand how 'island proofing' can be used as a tool in this context. Participants are local and regional representatives, national experts and policymakers, EU Commission, and the OECD.

To create effective policies for islands, it's important to have clear definitions and the right scale for analysis. However, research on island economies has been inconsistent, highlighting the need for detailed, island-specific data to support the well-being of island communities. Challenges include collecting detailed data, defining units of analysis, standardizing indicators, ensuring timely data, and making data accessible at all government levels. The main challenge is using the most relevant data to promote and sustain cooperation toward development goals for island economies in a multi-level governance system.

'Island proofing', formally introduced into law as Island Communities Impact Assessments (ICIAs) by the Scottish Government's Islands (Scotland) Act in 2018, is a relatively new concept in regional development policy. By considering the unique needs of island communities, ICIAs seek to enhance collaboration across policy areas and assess the effects of initiatives designed and implemented at all government levels. Under the Regulations, ICIAs require Relevant Authorities (including Scottish Ministers) to prepare an ICIA in relation to any policy, strategy, or service which is likely to have an effect on an island community. This provides a tool for implementing tailored, place-based policies, improving communication, ensuring fair resource distribution, enhancing crisis response, supporting economic sustainability, and protecting cultural heritage. By incorporating these principles into decision making, ICIAs not only boosts the resilience and well-being of Scotland's island communities, but they also showcases effective multi-level governance. Hence, island proofing is an effective way for policymakers to consider the impact of their work on island communities when amending, designing and implementing policies of any kind.

Despite being recognized, island proofing faces challenges such as building capacity, engaging stakeholders, dealing with administrative complexities, and ensuring equal access to data. Furthermore, national agencies often have to deal with other territorial or mainstreaming themes. The key challenge is adapting island proofing methods and tools to be useful not just for specific administrative functions but across multiple government levels and within each level so as to render results on the ground at island levels.
