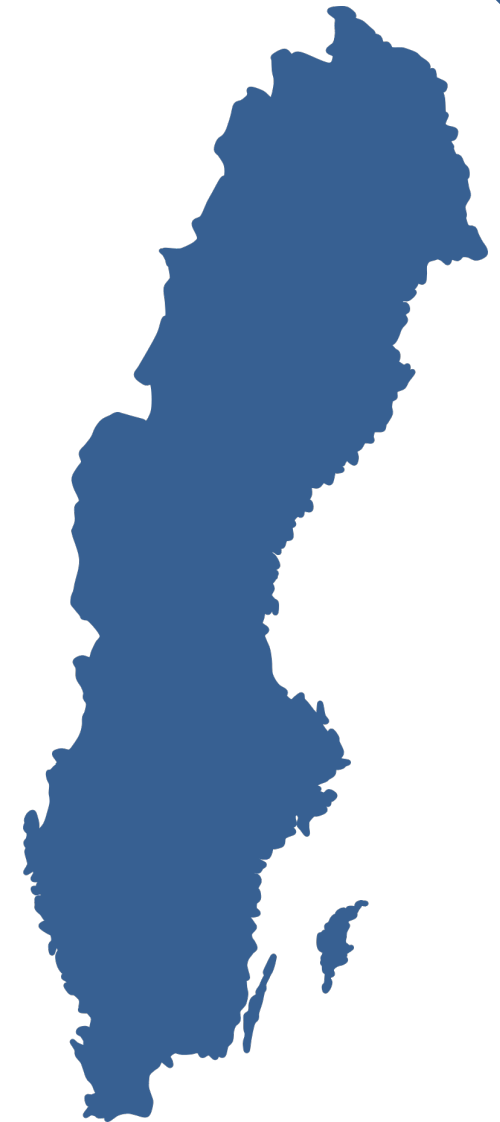

The National Islands Plan in Summary

THE CURRENT NATIONAL ISLANDS PLAN FEATURES 13 STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES AND OVER 130 COMMITMENTS.

IN LINE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THE ISLANDS ACT, ITS OVERARCHING OBJECTIVE IS THAT OF “IMPROVING OUTCOMES FOR ISLANDS COMMUNITIES”.

SCOTTISH MINISTERS ARE REQUIRED TO UPDATE PARLIAMENT ANNUALLY ON THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PLAN.

How is Islands Policy Funded?

Dedicated **resource and capital budget** support implementation. Investments delivered to date include:

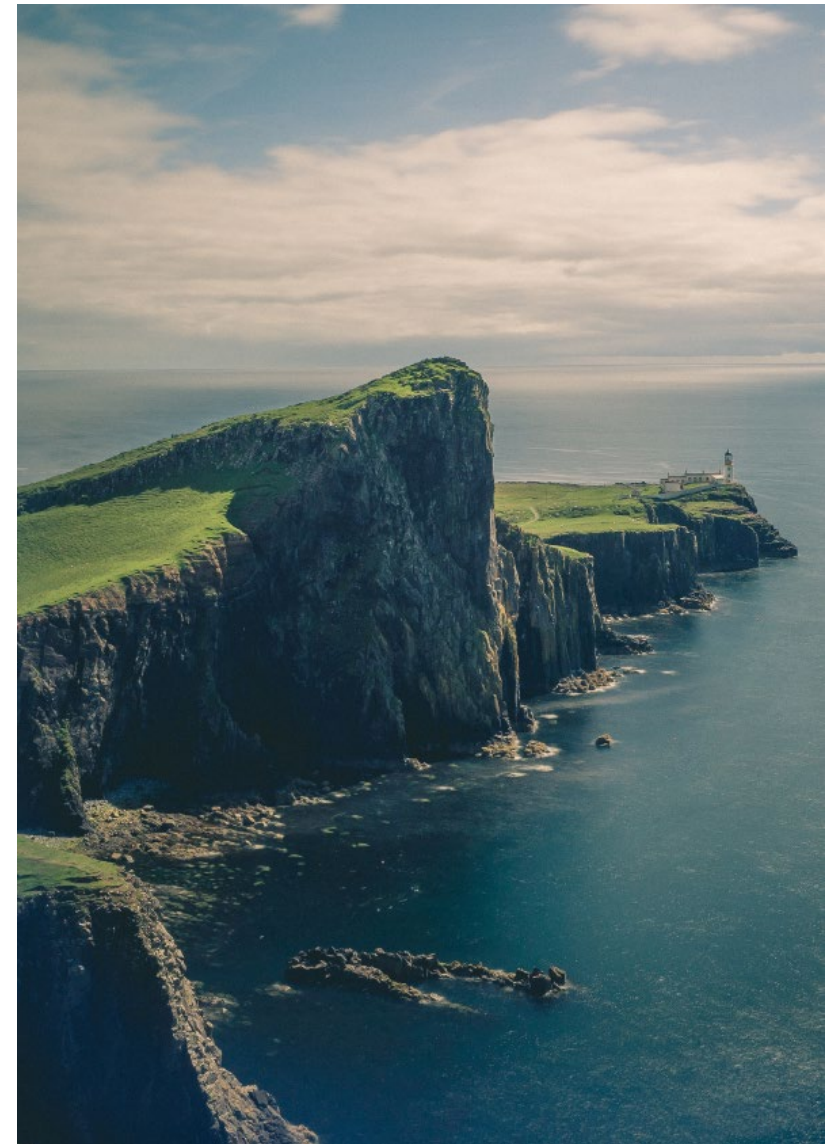
- **Over £15 million capital** since 2021-2022 through the **Islands Programme** in support of community-led islands infrastructure. To date, the fund has supported 71 projects on 51 different islands.
- **£3.4 million** since December 2022 through the **Islands Cost Crisis Emergency Fund**.
- **Grant funding for island organisations** including Young Islanders Network and Scottish Islands Federation.
- **Part-funding** support for:
 - **Community Settlement Officers roles** within Argyll and Bute Council and Comhairle Nan Eilean Siar contributing towards the objectives of the Addressing Depopulation Action Plan.
 - **Island-focused Senior Officer role** within North Ayrshire Council (Arran and Great Cumbrae).

HOWEVER, the delivery of islands policy includes commitments, investments and policy interventions spanning across the organisation (and beyond).



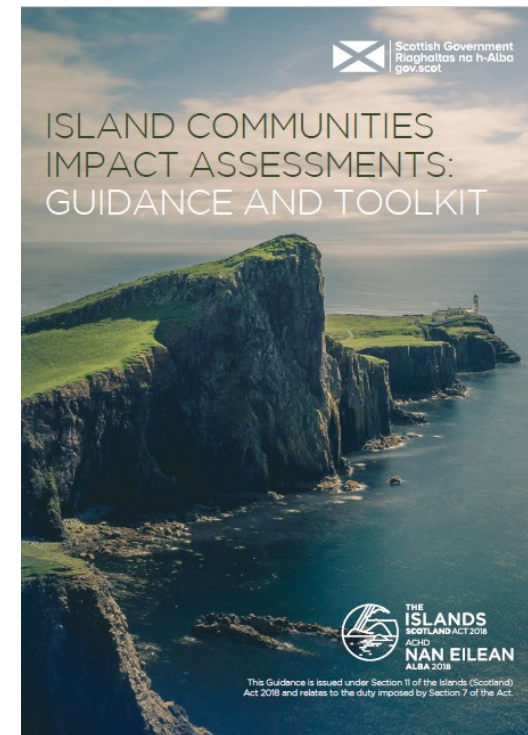
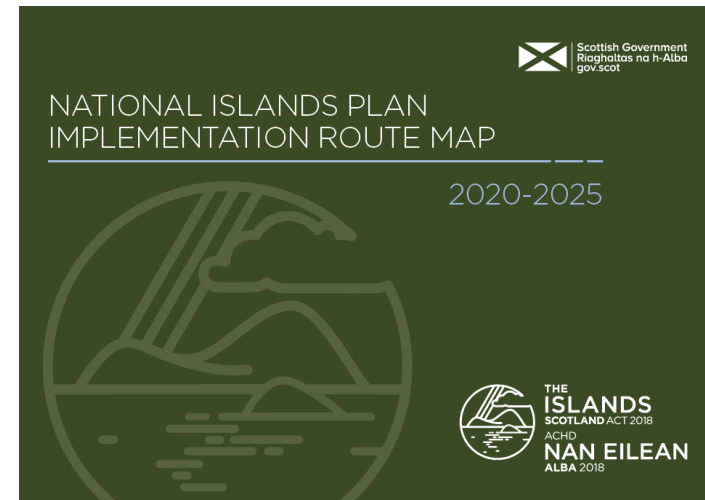
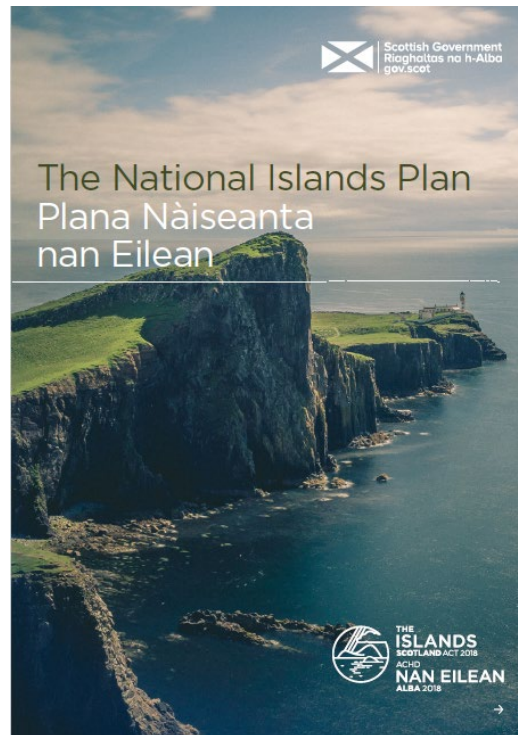
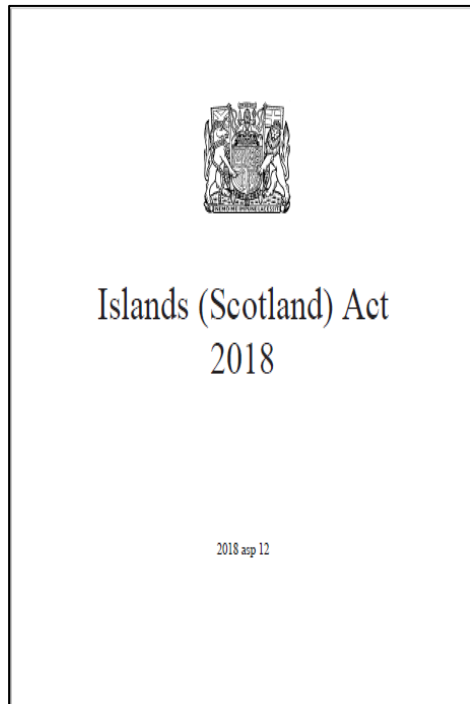
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ISLAND COMMUNITIES IMPACT ASSESSMENTS (ICIAs)





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- The National Islands Plan will help shape national policy
- Whilst Island Communities Impact Assessments serve a more immediate role.
- A relevant authority (including Scottish Ministers) must prepare an island communities impact assessment in relation to a policy, strategy or service which, in the authority's opinion, is likely to have an effect on an island community which is significantly different from its effect on other communities (including other island communities)





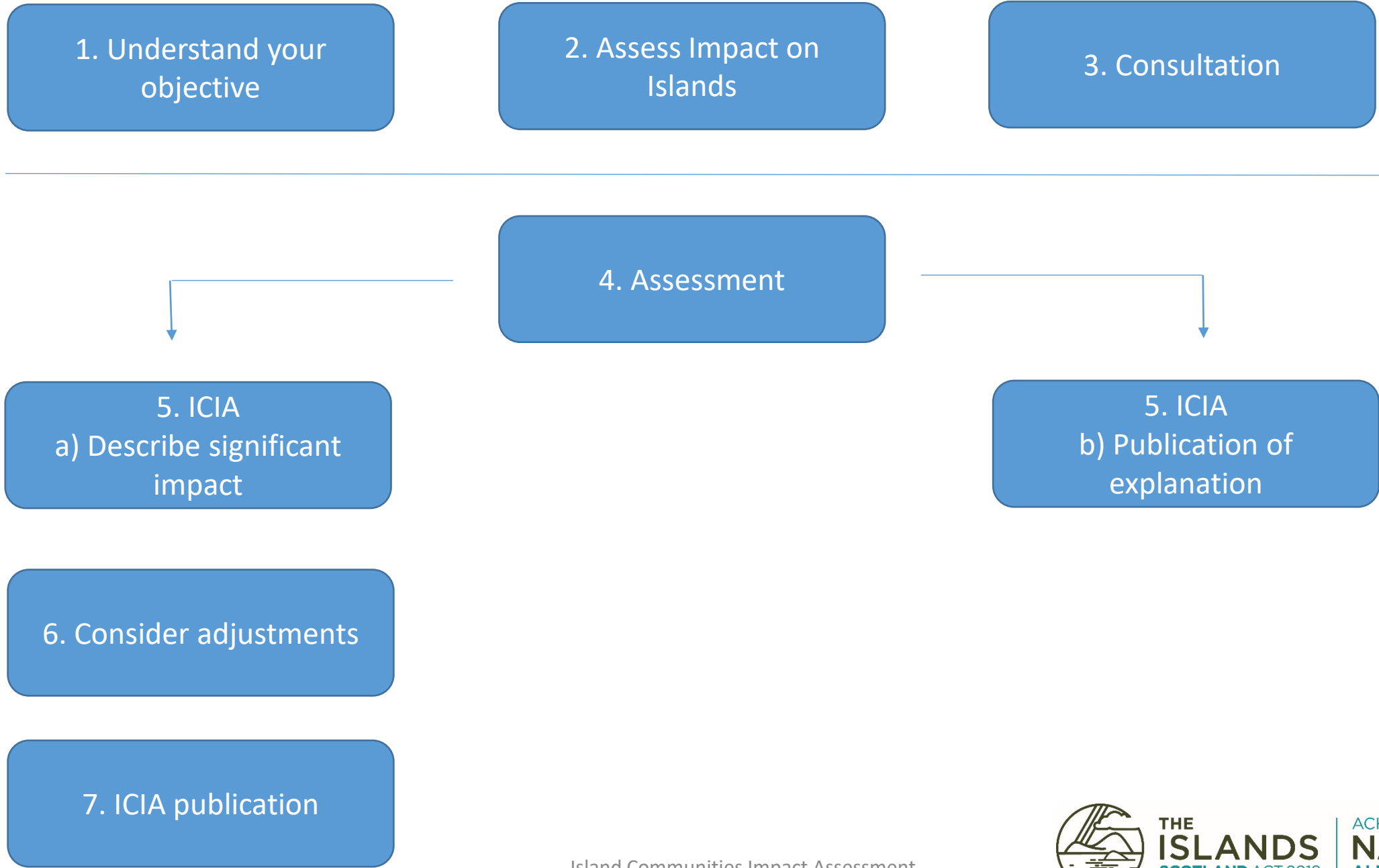
What will a good ICIA achieve?



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- An ICIA will help you to keep islands and their communities in mind throughout the development, implementation and delivery of your policy, strategy or service.
- Help us to support strong, resilient and vibrant island communities.
- Help us to meet the four principles of fairness, integration, environmental protection (green) and inclusiveness that underpin our work to support island communities.
- Promote the voice of island communities in issues that will effect them.
- Recognise that every person in Scotland has a right to live with dignity and to enjoy high quality public services wherever they live.







Develop a clear understanding of your objectives:

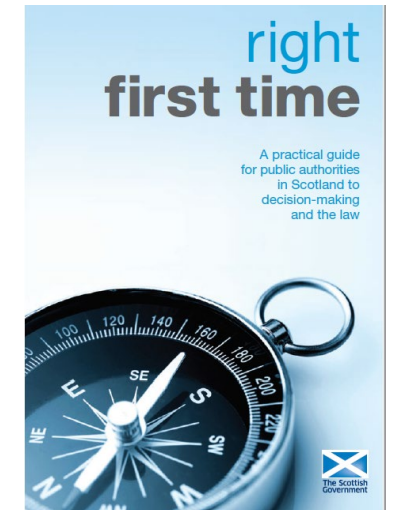
- What are the objectives and intended outcomes of your policy, strategy or service?
- Start identifying any potential direct or indirect impacts for Island communities?
- Is your policy, strategy or service:
 - Regional, area based – will the impact on Islanders differ from the regional impact?
 - Island based – does your policy, strategy or service adapt to variations across islands?
 - Mainland focused – is there a corresponding need in island communities?
- Start identifying potential benefits for the island communities.





Gather your data and identify your stakeholders:

- What are the differences that occur in islands communities and across island groups in contrast to Mainland Scotland?
- Sourcing of Islands Level Data.
- What other evidence is already to hand?
 - Other Consultations
 - Customer Feedback
 - Monitoring Exercises
- Working with island stakeholders.





Your consultation:

- If not already started, arrange to speak to the people likely to be affected by your policy, strategy or service.
- Consultation will give you lots of good information on the likely impact of your work, as well as providing you with a wider context relating to specific islands and the people who live on them.





Assessment :

- Consider potential impacts of your work (template in guidance) –
 - Demographic
 - Economic
 - Social
 - Gaelic
- Are these significantly different for Island communities?
- Record this and evidence the process in reaching that conclusion.
- Once finished you should decide if you need to complete further steps in the process.
- If you decide that you don't, you must publish as soon as reasonably practicable, your reasons for not carrying out an ICIA.





Preparing your ICIA

- The ICIA must (Section 8(3) of the Act):
 - Describe the likely significant different effect of your policy, strategy or service on Island communities.
- Clearly set out any impacts or effects of your work





Making adjustments to your work:

- Assess the extent to which you consider that your policy strategy or service can be developed or delivered, to improve or mitigate it for island communities.
- You should now have a range of information from which to draw some conclusions and make recommendations.
- Are adjustments, improvements required or are you simply adopting the policy, strategy or service, as it is proposed.
- You might want to pilot the policy, strategy or service or some of the mitigations in order to assess whether you can achieve your objectives without adverse effect.





Publishing your ICIA:

- ICIA Approved and signed off by a Senior member of the organisation (DD level).
- All ICIA's prepared by a relevant authority need to be published on their website. For Scottish Government an ICIA should be published through APS.

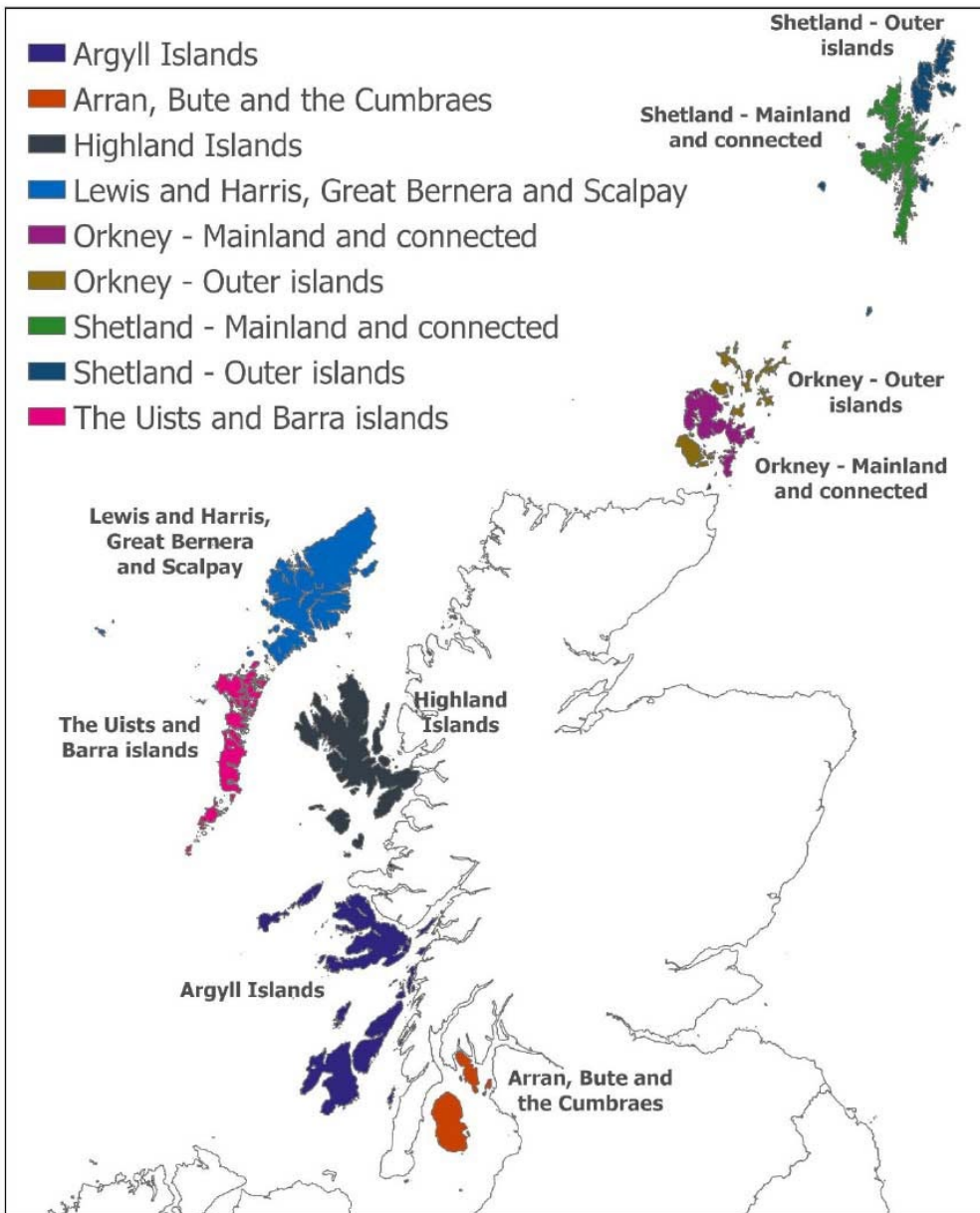

Health¹

More than one GP practice with resident doctors.

Arran War Memorial Hospital (Lamlash).

Ferries and fixed links¹

No fixed links to any other island / mainland Scotland.

Based on timetables published in November 2023 and covering the winter of 2023/4:

- Arran had access by road to 2 ferry route(s) connecting to mainland Scotland.
- Ferry services were operated by CalMac, departing from Brodick (route 1), Lochranza (route 2) and arriving in Ardrossan (route 1), Claonaig / Tarbert (route 2).
- Arran had access by road to 6.4 crossings leaving the island per day, with an average crossing time of 59 minutes.

Either no GP practice on island or visiting GP attends less than weekly.

No hospital on island.

Ferries and fixed links¹

No fixed links to any other island / mainland Scotland.

No direct ferry connection to mainland Scotland in winter 23/24.

Requires 2 ferries to access mainland Scotland, travelling via Mainland Shetland & connected isles.

The 2023 Scottish Islands Survey

20,000 surveys

posted to adult residents of
75 permanently inhabited islands

4,358 respondents

from 66 islands

22% response rate

vs 2020

From 394 variables in the 2023 survey, 117 were considered comparable. Of these:

- 15% (18) have improved;
- 23% (27) have stayed the same; and
- 62% (72) have declined since 2020.



THE GOOD NEWS: DIGITAL CONNECTIVITY, BUSINESS GROWTH AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WILLINGNESS TO REMAIN ON THEIR ISLAND



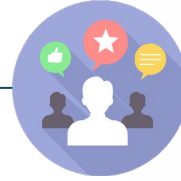
THE NOT SO GOOD NEWS: IN GENERAL, HOWEVER, THE SURVEY FOUND A DECLINE IN PERCEPTIONS OF ISLAND LIFE

- Public transport, housing, fuel poverty, sense of community
- Differences between age groups and between island groups

The 2023 Public Consultation: An Overview



ONLINE PORTAL: 167 responses submitted by 39 organisations and 128 individuals



WORKSHOP: 16 of which 13 in-person and 3 online. Total of 231 participants.

KEY THEMES

- IMPROVE COMMUNICATION AND INCREASE AWARENESS
- MIXED VIEWS ON IMPACT AND EFFECTIVENESS
- PERCEPTION THAT NO PROGRESS HAS BEEN MADE FOR MOST STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES
- A NEW PLAN IS REQUIRED
- PRIORITISATION OF COMMITMENTS AND STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

The New National Islands Plan: Key Principles



A more **agile** document, with fewer strategic objectives (BUT the Islands Act features a list of outcomes and thematic areas that must feature in the Plan).



A more **strategic** approach, with a focus on additionality. *“Focus on things that would not have happened without the Plan”.*



Fewer commitments but **tangible** and **measurable**.



A plan **connecting national and local**.

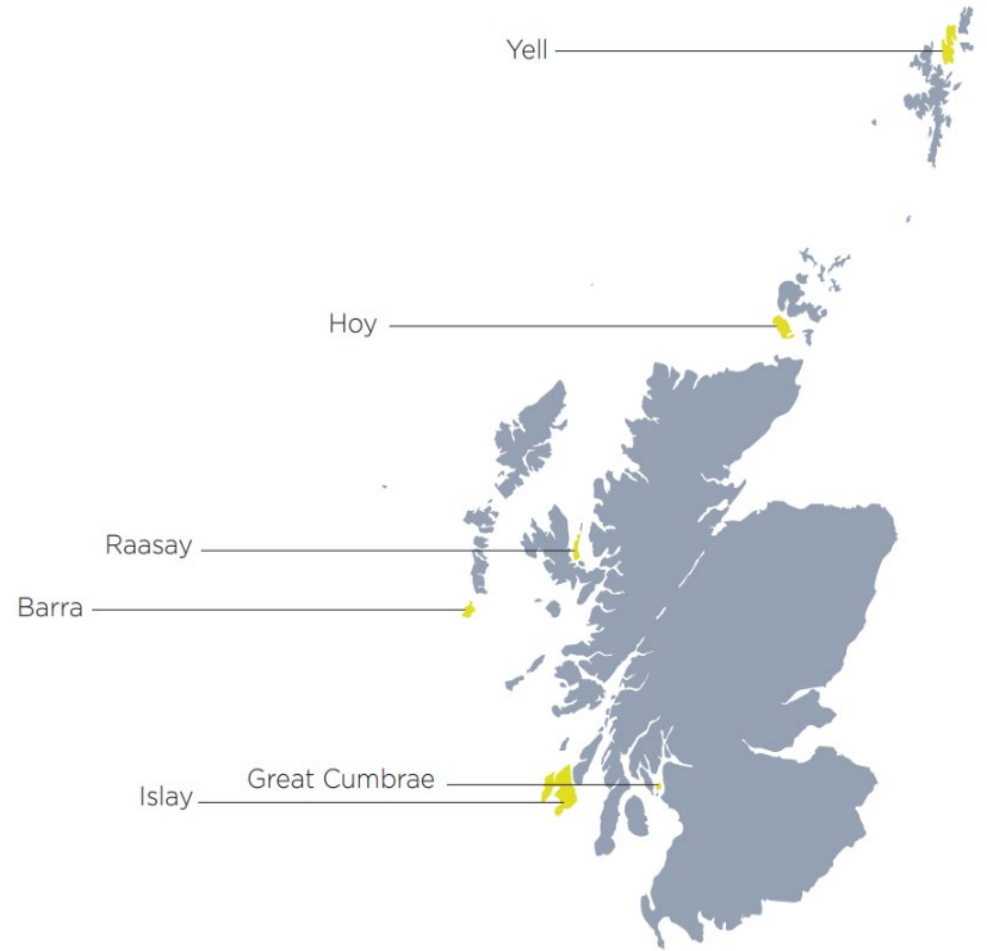


A **clear** allocation of responsibilities.



Carbon Neutral Islands - Investment

- 2022/2023 - £822,000 to develop Community Climate Action Plans and carbon audits
- 2023/2024 - £960,000 for project capital funding
- 2024/2025 - £1.3 million for project capital funding

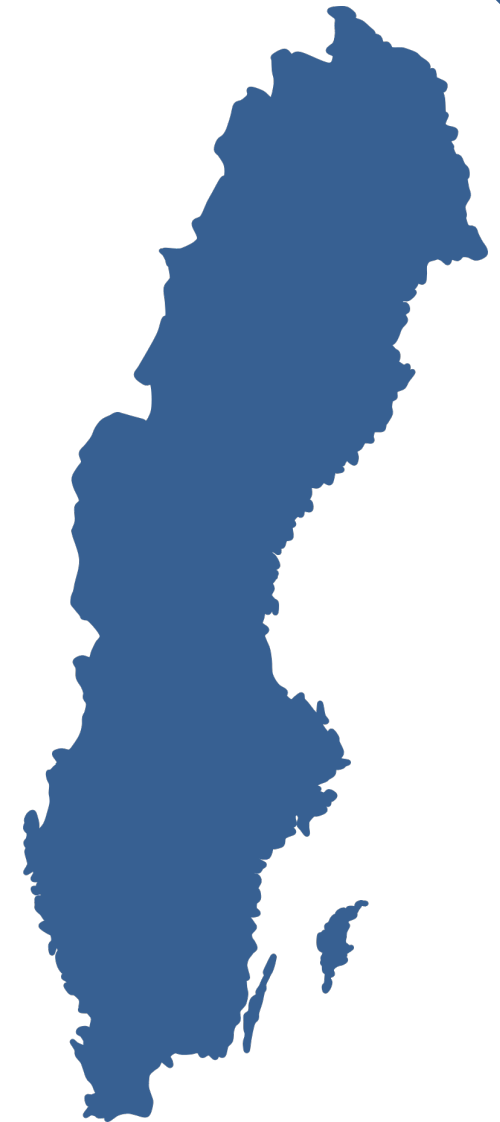

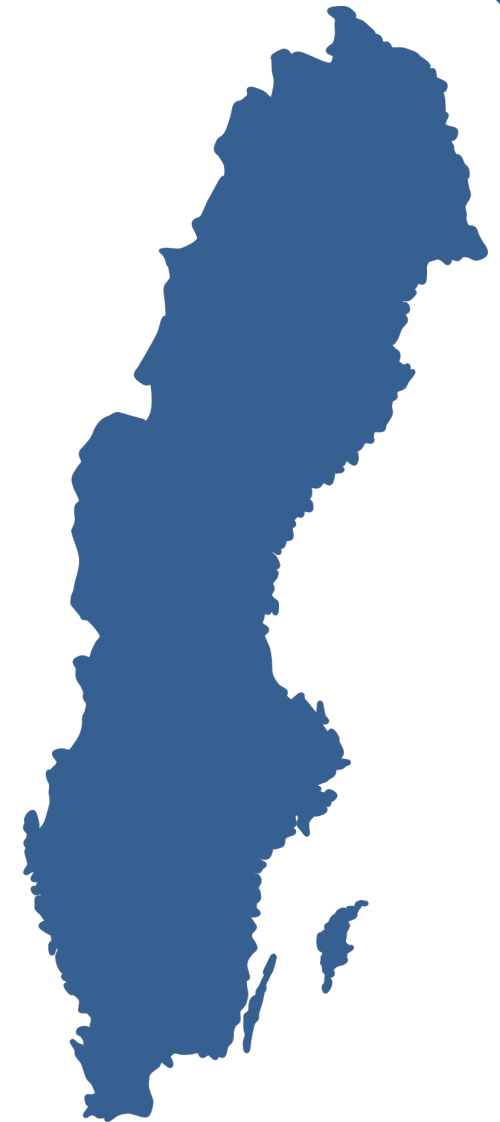

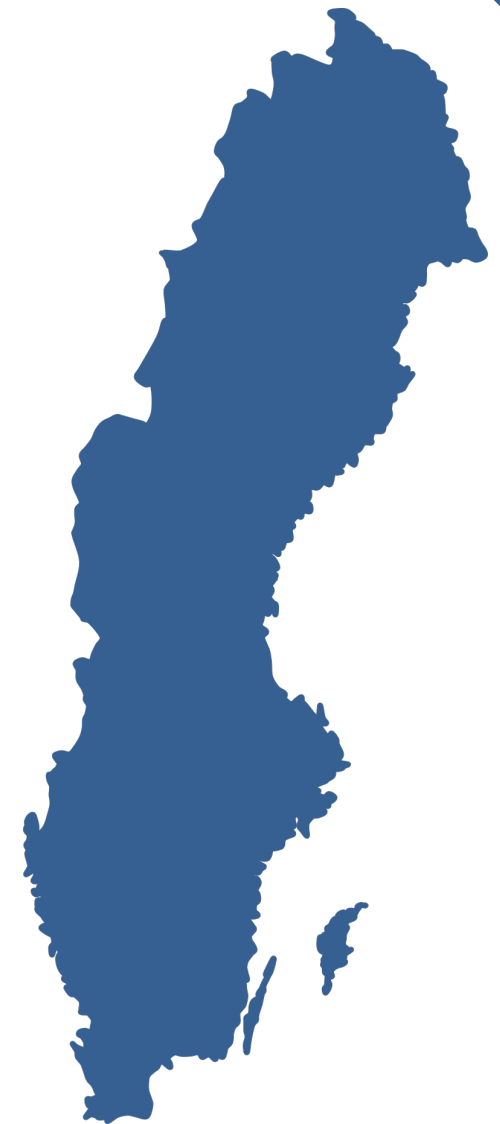
